Literary archives are per se international because their subject is international. Literature does not end at the borders of its country of origin or its language. Hence, literary archives hold material that is neither limited to a country nor a language although one country and language is usually dominant and it might even be that an archive has the official task and is funded in order to preserve the literary heritage of a specific territory. How can we conceptualize literary archives in their regional and global frameworks and develop them further? To what extent does digitization foster international cooperation within and beyond the archives and how can we make it more fruitful? How can archives meet the interests of the literary public and of researchers? How can we enhance exchange across the borders and, ultimately, enrich literary life from its vibrant history?

The digital conference #LiteraryArchiveOfTheFuture gathers scholars, authors, writers, archivists, and curators to examine in short keynote contributions and roundtable discussions the question: "What does it mean and to what purpose does one run an archive for literature?", to paraphrase Friedrich Schiller.
